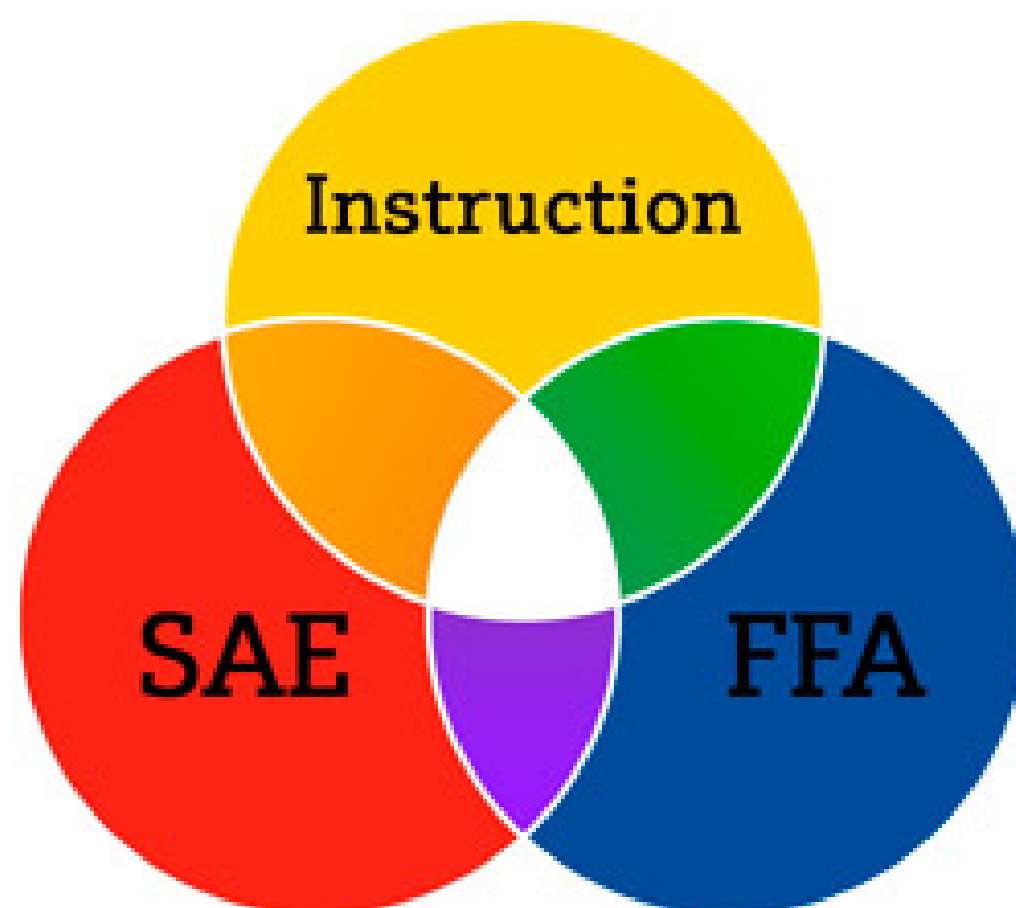


The National FFA Organization is the country's largest youth organization with more than 735,000 members and over 8,000 chapters worldwide. FFA makes a positive difference in the lives of students by developing their potential for premier leadership, personal growth, and career success through Agriscience education.

In Delaware, there are more than 4,500 members and 45 chapters; including 24 high school chapters and 21 middle school chapters. As more schools are adding Agriscience education to their curriculum, more chapters are being chartered each year.



FFA prepares students for over 300 agricultural careers that currently employ more than 24 million Americans.

Agriscience education in Delaware includes five programs of study: Animal Science and Management, Ag Power and Engineering, Ag Structures and Engineering, Natural Resource Management, and Plant Science.

Agriscience education builds awareness of agriculture's dynamic role in society. In Delaware, there are more than 12,000 students enrolled in Agriscience education. The students learn through hands-on activities during classroom/laboratory instruction and have the opportunity to apply what they learn in the classroom/laboratory to a Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) program.



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
